
We have thoroughly enjoyed researching HPPS through reading articles, searching through old photos and interviewing past and present staff and students.

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


Interview with Rosemary Digger

Rosemary Digger was a teacher who started at HPPS in 1981 and was here for 30 years which means she taught approximately 900 students in her time! Mrs Digger has fond memories of teaching at



HPPS and was involved in lots of different activities including choir, sport and futsal teams. She implemented a discipline system called Stop Think Do and introduced yellow merit awards and pink slips. Students needed to collect the yellow merits to get bronze, silver and gold awards. If you received double gold you were invited to go to a gold morning tea in the school hall with the Principal and you were allowed to eat yummy food.



When Mrs Digger started at HPPS, Forest Grove wasn't built yet and you could see fields. There weren't any fences in the past just posts and 2 pieces of wire. Kindy students loved pleasing their teachers and they would collect flowers from the cemetery form next door. One day a student came in with an entire wreath and that is when Mr Twist decided to put up a wooden fence. The back area was closed for a year because they brought in 200 truckloads of dirt to make it flat and then another year to allow the grass to grow through. In the back playground, they used to do cross country in the paddock behind the school and the kids ran around the paddock and the dam with ducks. The fastest kids got chased by horses and cows which made them run even faster!



Behind the library, where the staff carpark is, there was a very high climbing frame and kids would climb all the way to the top and do flips off it. They called it the death drops. Some parents were worried, and a couple of kids broke their arms. Mr Digger came in and fixed it, so it was a lot safer. All you could see from the back playground was cows and paddocks.

Kids on the way to school would save apples and carrots from their lunchboxes and feed 2 donkeys and they ended up being really fat donkeys from all the snacks.

A roller-skating rink used to be near the round-a-bout. HPPS used to go there on a Friday afternoon for sport and would have school dances at the roller-skating rink. Other sports that students played were soccer, cricket, tennis, hockey. Sport has changed a lot, students and teachers used to go on the bus every Friday afternoon and visit other schools to play sport.

The uniform has changed so much over the years. Boys had to wear a white button-up shirt (which used to end up so grubby) and grey shorts with black shoes. Girls were only allowed to wear dresses, no shorts or pants. The P&C wanted to update the uniforms, so they changed to red shirts and then changed to the current green/blue shirts which we have today.



Students and staff at HPPS started knitting because Mrs Digger was knitting one day, and the students were keen to learn. The boys were great knitters and each student would knit a small square and then they would get sewn together to make blankets. Students would sit in the playground to knit and the teachers walked around on playground duty knitting. HPPS gave away hundreds and hundreds of blankets for homeless people and anyone that needed them. HPPS received prestigious community awards for such a wonderful service.




Hayes Park Public School Turns 50!

The blue whale's tongue weighs the same as an elephant!


They are the largest animals to live on Earth.

Thank you, Mr. Galea, for taking the time to answer a few questions.

What was Hayes Park like when you first started teaching?

Calm, minimal computers, blackboards, weekly sport, minimal behaviour problems.

What was the uniform like when you started teaching?

The sports uniform was red and green and there was no school hat. The boys wore white shirts and they were always dirty. The school shorts were green, and they wore a red sports shirt. The year 6 shirts have changed, they were white with a cartoon on them.

Did teachers have a cane when you were teaching?

No, that was before my time.

Who was the principal when you started?

Mr Twist.

When you started did the teachers have to wear certain clothes?

No, we could just wear smart attire.

Has the school expanded since you started?

Yes, student enrolment has grown from 460 to over 560. A new office, a new staff room and the learning hub have all been built since I first started. The Learning Lab used to be the office.

How much has HPPS changed since you started?

Behaviour of students is changing. Using computers on a daily basis has changed how students learn and how teachers teach. Life seems busier now and students are a bit more stressed. The staff has changed a lot, Mr. Crighton and I are the only 2 teachers still here from when I first started and HPPS have had 4 different principals.

How old were you when you started to work here?

I was 25.

Principal Interview with *Mr. Honeywood*

If you ever went to the director of all the schools in NSW would you tell him/her to change anything about the punishment system or would you just leave it as it is? I would ask for them to acknowledge good work more often.

Is there anything that you would like to add? I hope more students make wise decisions and positive choices.







Mrs Gould Our Amazing Librarian

We asked Mrs Gould, our much-loved librarian and well-known history teacher, some questions about our library, reading and HPPS.

Thank you for taking the time to answer some questions.

How long have you been at HPPS?

I have been at Hayes Park for 9 wonderful years.

Did you always want to be a librarian? Why?

Not always. Initially I was very happy being a classroom teacher. After time off, when I had my own children, I was offered a position as teacher librarian at a previous school. I went back to university (part time) and obtained an extra degree in teacher librarianship.

Now I have the best job in the school!

What are your favourite books in our library?

This question is too hard! We have so many wonderful books in our library. I frequently say, "Oh, you are borrowing one of my favourites" or "Good choice. That is a great book." Books are getting more exciting all the time. Some are funny, some are adventurous while others cover serious and relevant issues.

The books that I 'loved, loved, loved' growing up were the Famous Five and Secret Seven books written by Enid Blyton. We have new editions of these books in our library.

I recently read one of this year's shortlisted books, 'His Name Was Walter' by Emily Rodda. It has now become one of my favourites. The Children's Book Council of Australia judges agree with me because they chose it as the winner of the 'Book of the Year: Younger Readers' category.

What is one book you think every child must read when they are in primary school?

Every child should be allowed to select their own favourite books. My aim is for every student to *want* to read and I encourage them to read a range of genres and formats. It is very rewarding for me to be able to help students select a book that they love. This year's theme for book week is, 'Reading is my Secret Power'. My wish is for every student to discover the power and joy of reading.



What are the top 5 most popular books?

We have loaned out over 11,600 books so far this year. Many of our students are avid readers.

- The most popular book borrowed (65 times already this year) is **Sisters** which is a graphic novel (comic book) written by Raina Telgemeier. We had to buy multiple copies to try and keep up with demand. They don't sit on the shelf for long. Raina's first book, **Smile**, is also very popular.
- Anh Do's book, **HotDog!** comes in next with all the hotdog series being popular.
- **Minecraft construction handbook** is equal second. Once again, all the Minecraft books have been very sought after. We have 5 copies of each, and students still have to reserve on these books.
- Roald Dahl's **The Twits** and **Georges Marvellous Medicine** come in as the next most popular books. Some of our teachers have read Roald Dahl's books in class and this has encouraged students to borrow his books.
- **Pig the Elf** by Aaron Blabey is also very popular. It is no secret that the Pig the Pug series brings joy to our young students.

I have cheated a little and mentioned more than five books. Of course, Andy Griffiths' **Treehouse** series and Jeff Kinney's **Diary of a Wimpy Kid** Series are still very popular as well.

How has the school changed since you have arrived?

We have bought thousands of new books for the school, the gardens are much nicer now, there are lots of beautiful artworks and murals around the school and the office used to be where the learning lab is.

Thank you so much Mrs Gould, we are extremely lucky to have you as our librarian.




Dr Drake


25 years ago, school members participated in creating a 25-year anniversary newspaper.






